Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for by so doing some people have shown hospitality to angels without knowing it. Hebrews 13:2

I have been at St. John's for less than a month and I already know you understand the Biblical call to offer hospitality. My husband Chris and I have felt very welcomed into your midst as you have introduced yourselves and offered kind greetings. You also show great hospitality as a church family by generously offering meeting space in the church building for community groups including the Dayton Tamil Language Academy, 12 Step groups, Girl Scouts and others. Well done, faithful servants of God!

Offering hospitality is an important concept in scripture. In Biblical times it was an expectation that you would house and feed those who came to your door, even if they were strangers. Look up the story of Abraham and the three visitors in Genesis 18, or the story of Elizabeth welcoming Mary when they were both pregnant in Luke 1. Then there is this wonderful verse from Hebrews quoted above.

This season provides endless possibilities to offer hospitality to those we encounter each day. What might it look like to offer hospitality to store clerks, drive thru cashiers, office receptionists, coworkers? Hospitality is a posture not a place. Hospitality means creating space for another—which can either be in our home or in our heart. Even if it's only for a moment, "holding space" for another can be a way to offer the love of Christ.

At St John's, as we prepare for the coming of Jesus, we work to offer hospitality to folks we will probably never meet in the flesh. The Christmas Forest and the winter clothing collection are both ways to offer hospitality to strangers. When we care for the vulnerable we communicate to them that they are beloved to God and to us. A generous spirit extended to others honors Jesus, who himself was poor and born in a stable.

Hospitality is a posture, not a place. This Advent, be on the lookout for ways you can offer care to others simply by being a listening ear. By offering kindness instead of criticism. By building others up rather than tearing them down. Welcoming rather than excluding. Offering grace rather than judgement. We can offer hospitality to strangers, friends and family in these ways.

I look forward to observing this season of Advent with you as we wait for Jesus to take on flesh and come among us. I am eager to celebrate his birth on Christmas Eve as we remember the great hospitality God has shown us by coming into our world.

President's Chapel

Dear Siblings in Christ,

December 1st, 2022

Yes, it is really December and we are now in the Season of Advent as we prepare the way for the arrival of our Lord Jesus Christ. It seems to me as the years go by how quickly the season comes upon us, as we just celebrated Thanksgiving on November 24th, and suddenly thoughts change to decorations, gifts, baking, and the bustle of the Holiday Seasons. But today, I want to put in perspective that grace and mercy is not meant to be stashed in our Sanctuary. We need to live it in our Community, and to illustrate that properly, I need to roll back the clock to October and describe to all the amazing cultural and enlightenment experience Linda and I recently had.

On October 23rd, Linda and I were graciously invited by our Tamil School Leaders to attend the annual Hindu Festival of "Diwali" in Beavercreek. Diwali (also called Divali or Deepavali) is a "festival of lights" that celebrates the triumph of light over dark and good over evil, and the blessings of victory, freedom, and enlightenment. The name comes from Sanksrit dipavali, meaning "row of lights." On the night of Diwali, celebrants light dozens of candles and clay lamps (called diyas), placing them throughout their homes and in the streets to light up the dark night. Linda and I accepted the invitation, which is considered a great honor if you are a non-Hindu. When we arrived, we were graciously welcomed and taken to very prominent seats in their auditorium to witness the heart of the Diwali celebration. This included fantastic adult and children's dancing, a traditional Diwali fashion show with dresses in gorgeous Diwali colors of deep blue, purple, bright yellow, and maroon. We witness a spirited moral debate about the good and evil of the cell phone, which while mostly in Tamil, left a strong impression of how passionate the balance of good over evil was emphasized. What I did not expect was after the main event I was invited on stage, where the Tamil Principal and The Beavercreek Sangram Leader (like our pastor) presented Linda and I with roses and a public thanks to St. Johns for helping them set up the language school. After the main ceremony closed, the entire room stood up and sang our National Anthem, clearly showing how grateful many were for being able to settle in the US after decades of war in their home in Sri Lanka, and of their freedom to worship without persecution. The day was closed with sampling an amazing array of Hindi foods in a giant community meal. During dinner, many families came up to Linda and I, thanking us profusely for allowing our Church to host the Tamil academy.

So why am I taking this time and column to write about this? Because I wanted to tell you that through our grace and our courage, we have supplied them with a safe place to preserve their culture with their children, teach them the language of their home, and to integrate into our community. Pastor and I are meeting with their leadership in 2 weeks, because they are also very interested in participating in some of our community outreach activities like the hunger ministry. The light and love of St John's has shown them another example of a pathway to light. While we may not share identical religious traditions, it is clear this relationship is far more than "owner- tenant." So as

we prepare for Christmas, and the arrival of God's son who was sent to overcome once and for all the sin of the world, consider that our Christmas trees and decorations represent our own "festival of lights." Surely we can all agree that God's peace and grace can transcend the differences within our own communities. I certainly pray it to be.
